## NEWSLETTER - DECEMBER 2018

### Silent Night

It was Christmas Eve 1818, exactly 200 years ago, in the small Austrian village of Oberndorf that the worst disaster that could ever befall a church happened ... the organ broke down! It's thought that mice had eaten through the leather of the bellows. So, hastily, the parish priest and organist wrote a carol they could sing together to a guitar accompaniment and, thus, "Silent Night" was first heard.

The words are by Joseph Mohr who was born in 1792, adopted by the local church and sang at St. Peter's church in Salzburg where Michael Haydn directed the music, before being ordained into the Roman Catholic Church. The original words bear no relation to the version translated into English that we sing now. There were six verses which refer frequently to fatherhood but never mention motherhood or the Virgin Mary. Whereas we sing "*holy infant so tender and mild*" the original words translate as "*the sweet boy with curly hair*" and the original words are thought to relate more to the joy of the retreat of Napoleon and the Franco-Bavarian armies from Austria than the coming of Christ.

Mohr seems to have been quite a character relating well to the boatmen who made up the majority of his congregation. His bishop complained that "he gambles and drinks at night and sings ... unwholesome songs. He jokes with members of the opposite sex, doesn't behave in a spiritual manner and goes out with women."

The tune was supplied by the organist at Oberndorf, Franz Gruber [1787-1863] who was school master at the village next door and together they gave the first performance next to the crib at midnight mass on Christmas Eve 1818 in St. Nicholas Church. The church and whole village were demolished and moved to a higher site in 1905 after two destructive floods, but the Silent Night chapel now stands on the site and is visited by thousands of pilgrims eager to hear the carol sung.

To save you the bother of travelling all that way, the choir are going to sing it at St. Bart's as part of our Christmas services to mark its bicentenary. I'm definitely not producing a guitar, so please keep any mice away from the organ.

We meet for half an hour to worship: sharing in song, prayer, conversations and snacks.


All are welcome to attend - children MUST be accompanied by an adult at all times.


